<u>Chapter 9 – Answers</u>

- Boxer is becoming weaker. His one ambition is 'to see the windmill well under way before he reached the age for retirement.'
- 2. There is a plan for animals when they retire; a pasture has been put aside for grazing and rations would be allocated. Boxer is nearly twelve, which is relevant because he will be due to retire.
- 3. It is a hard winter. Rations are reduced. Squealer does not use the word 'reduction'. He uses the word 'readjustment'.
- 4. We learn that there are many young animals on the farm, including several young pigs. We learn that 'a schoolroom would be built in the farmhouse garden'.
- 5. Rations are further reduced, but the pigs 'seemed comfortable enough'. Finish this line: 'on the following Sunday it was announced that from now onwards all barley would be reserved for the pigs'
- 6. Moses the raven reappears on the farm in this chapter, after an absence of several years.
- 7. Boxer falls in this chapter; he collapses while dragging a cartload of stone. Squealer claims to send Boxer to the vet. He is really sent to the 'Horse Slaughterer and Glue Boiler' (or the knacker).
- 8. Squealer claims that Boxer died in a hospital in Willingdon.
- 9. Napoleon tells the animals that he has ordered a wreath for Boxer's grave. Napoleon said that every animal would do well to adopt Boxer's maxims 'I will work harder' and 'Comrade Napoleon is always right.'
- 10. A case of whisky is delivered to the farmhouse for the banquet in Boxer's honour.
